Maggie and Jordan

Jordan Mackintosh is our second pupil at Drummond School who has reached graduation level on the MOVE Programme. At entry in 2006, Jordan could move around the school in his gait trainer with supports and would shuffle around the floor in the class. He could sit on an ordinary classroom chair without support, but needed assistance from his wheelchair through transition.

Jordan is a very sociable boy and he is great to work with. He is willing to try anything we put to him and his determination has shone through with every step.

He amazed us at how quickly he progressed through the Programme and by January 2007 Jordan was walking with two people for support all around the school. We may have been a bit late arriving for some classes, but hey– we got there on two feet!!

There has been no stopping him. A month later he could walk a short distance independently, and for longer distances he only needed one hand for support. By April, gone was the use of the walls as a support to master his turning skills, as this was superseded by a wide sweeping turn!

By June 2007, he walked out of school independently to the delight of his parents and class team.

Jordan mastered going up and down steps in 2008 and he graduated at our Easter School Production of 'Just Do What you Can' in March 2009. (See accompanying article).

Ever the showman, on reaching the top of the steps, he raised his arms in celebration of his achievement. The audience, carried away with the same feelings, clapping, smiling, laughing and a few tears, all enjoyed themselves.

Linda Schubert, Head Teacher comments: "The MOVE Presentation took place on Monday 23rd March 2009 in Drummond School and as the head teacher I am always interested to see what activities are taking place in the school but I was unprepared for the way this performance impacted on the whole school.

The thought and work that had gone in to this performance by all the staff was really outstanding and I was truly moved to see how the pupils were at the centre of everything.

The whole event moved us all and from it we have adopted a whole school motto of 'do what you can'.



All of our pupils are important to us and our overriding aim is to give them independence and choice and this performance did exactly that, I can only say how proud I was to sit in the audience for both performances and would once again like to thank the wonderful staff for their true dedication. 'Three Cheers' for Mayfield School

We are pleased to announce that one of MOVE's Regional Centre's of Excellence, Mayfield School, Cumbria has recently achieved Specialist School Status, awarded on the 1st September 2009.

The Specialist School Programme promotes raising standards by providing opportunities for Mayfield School to work to its strengths, enabling them to deliver effective training, teaching and learning within their area of expertise.

Mayfield School caters for young people with a broad spectrum of sensory, multi-sensory, physical and medical difficulties. All students need access to specialist facilities and equipment. Some impairment's may lead to more complex learning difficulties and social needs and some students have both multi-sensory difficulties together with associated physical difficulties. There are also students who present challenging behaviours.

Mayfield School's vision:

- To be a Specialist Special School for students with sensory and physical needs.
- To have an excellent range of communication approaches to ensure students develop their communication skills to fully participate in school and community life.
- To provide students with experience of a very particular physical and learning environment.
- To provide high quality and well-maintained resources which will give students regular access to a wide range of specialist equipment to enable their full participation in the curriculum.

Mayfield Schools' ethos is to have a very strong emphasis on inclusive working beyond the boundaries of the school. We will seek to provide specialist input including a fully integrated seamless service to students other than their own, to families, professionals, the voluntary sector and through outreach, training and partnership working with a range of schools, with services and multi-agency providers.

Mayfield Specialist School – Physical and Sensory Needs, will work with named partner schools for the benefit of pupils beyond our school boundaries and with groups in the community. This ensures that the Programme has an impact by creating a diverse network of secondary and community provision through the sharing of good practice and expertise.

MOVE Electronic Assessment Profile and Mobility Passport

The MOVE Programme has moved into the 21st century to create a paperless and easy to use system to record MOVE Assessments.

The MOVE Assessment Profile and Mobility Passport CD-Rom provides the technology to create a profile for each individual you are working with, whilst taking you through the Assessment Profile automatically. The software also enables you to attach external media to an individual's profile, including video clips and photos.

The software can be used on an individual PC, or placed on a server to supply 5 or 10 workstations with the programme. You will no longer have to keep countless paper documents as all will be stored on your system. On piloting the CD-Rom, MOVE Consultant Anke Baillie comments:

"The interactive MOVE Assessment CD Rom is a very welcome and user friendly piece of software which should make MOVE's 6 Step Process much easier and quicker to complete. It produces an individualised mobility passport and assessment profile with the ability to include video images, photos or other external documents. It is easy to use and can be shared with and updated by all team members. A printed version can be taken home and shared with family/carers and friends."

The Assessment Profile and Mobility Passport CD-Rom should be available to order from December 2009 from the MOVE Europe office at the following prices:

1 user - £60
5 users - £200
10 users - £350

Not only will the CD-Rom ensure that maintaining MOVE paperwork is far less time consuming, it will also allow us at MOVE Europe to gain essential evidence and produce reports on the improvements that the MOVE Programme can bring to a disabled child or adult. These reports will also be made available to the organisations providing us with the information required.

By the end Jack was so obviously tired it was almost pitiful but once he had the finish line in his sights, he grabbed the flag and almost sprinted to the end. He was so proud of himself and more than one person had tears in their eyes. Mum insisted that Jack get into his wheelchair, which he did under protest. Once he was settled in and surrounded by people with tears running down their cheeks he looked around as only Jack can and said "so... what are we doing next year"?

Through generous sponsorship we managed to raise a total of £756.69 for MOVE Europe, with over £100 of this coming from the collections bucket. Chris and Pete were legends for running with us and we thank them from the bottom of our hearts.

Quality Mark

The MOVE Quality Mark is currently being piloted throughout the UK by a number of schools. The feedback we have received back from them so far has been extremely positive.

Our Quality Mark is an inclusive award which can be attained by all types and sizes of schools and organisations as an external validation and is also given in recognition of good practice and progress in the MOVE Principles.

Our model is based on the Basic Skills Agency Quality Mark approach. It provides a framework for continuous improvement and self evaluation which will support schools, centres and other organisations in gathering evidence for the monitoring and inspection process.

Those organisations choosing to work towards the award will find that it adds value to current teaching and learning practices with children and adults who also have complex physical disabilities, and will support improved outcomes for them. Each organisation will be able to control the timescale for making a submission.

Achieving a MOVE Quality Mark will provide public recognition for staff and the organisation in their work with individuals with complex physical and learning disabilities. Furthermore, in attaining a MOVE Quality Mark, your organisation will be awarded a plaque and a MOVE Quality Mark logo which can be added to your organisation's headed paper.

Piloting of the MOVE Quality Mark will be completed by January 2010 when a price structure to cover our costs will be published.

Question:

“There is not enough time in the day to fit everything we are required to do already, how can we manage this effectively?”

Answer:

MOVE does not ask you to incorporate extra activities into the day or to do extra work, just to use the opportunities already available throughout the day, maybe in a slightly different way.

All activities are seen as opportunities to learn functional motor skills: the goals and subsequent task analysis will clearly determine which skills need to be practiced and these should be incorporated into existing care and learning routines. However, all everyday activities should be treated as opportunities to practice and reinforce the learning of the identified skills.
